Mark Riddell left care in 1984. As a social work Manager in Trafford he achieved Ofsted's first 'outstanding' rating in the country for care leaver services. In 2017 he received an MBE in the Queen's New Year Honours list for his outstanding contribution to children in care and care leavers.

He worked informally alongside the Children's Minister Edward Timpson on the Care Leavers Strategy and was appointed as the National Implementation Adviser for Care Leavers within the DfE in 2017. Mark also penned a book called The Cornflake Kid which about his time in the care system and subsequent travels around the world – including a chance casting in one of Sylvester Stallone's Rambo movies.
